The Railway Commission is now at work on miscellaneous matters.

Judging from the large pile of granite in front of the Adams building to be used for building the vault, it will be a huge affair. The work of renovating the building for the Farmers and Commercial Bank is rapidly progressing.

It is now understood that all obstacles in the way of running the factory branch of the North Carolina road to the Raleigh Mills are at an end.

The board of county commissioners were in session again today revising the list of assessments wherever it was found proper.

Active preparations are in progress for the fall opening of the Agricultural and Mechanical College. The outlook for a large attendance is good.

The agricultural statistics for the various counties are being carefully arranged in cases at the Department of Agriculture.

Two important county institutes will be held this week—one at Graham, 19th, and one in Davie county on the 23d.

University students must reach Chapel Hill, September 1st, in order to secure rooms Sept. 2. Over one hundred applications for admission have been received. Seats in the chapel will be awarded Sept. 2d.

The riding gallery will open again next Friday at the same place, corner of Hargett and Blount streets. It will be under the management of Mr. Geo. W. Brinkley, who will see to it that it will be conducted in the most admirable manner. Let all get ready to take a ride.

A Noble Cause.

A proposal was made some years since to raise a memorial to the late Rt. Rev. Thomas Atkinson, Bishop of the diocese of North Carolina, an endowment fund of \$2,500 for the support of a child's cot in St. John's Hospital. The work has, thus far, been carried on mostly by the Messengers of Hope, a volunteer organization of children, who have raised \$2,100. The sum of \$400 is now lacking to complete the endowment, and for this, an earnest appeal is now made to raise it.

A Sad Case.

Yesterday a convict was brought to the penitentiary from Orange county, who was sentenced to seven years for larceny. He was only thirteen years old, so that just as he is beginning to bud into manhood he will be released, having spent the most susceptible part of his young life in the society of hardened criminals. This is a case that affords much food for reflection and should cause an investigation of the matter of establishing in our State a house of correction for such youthful offenders. We hope the next General Assembly will give it a most complete consideration, and that Governor Holt will earnestly urge it in his annual message. It is a matter of deep importance

The Grape Crop.

We are sorry to learn that our grape growers have realized very low prices on their fruit this year, and from what we can gather will not make expenses on their crop. This was caused by being two weeks late in shipment, owing to the long season of cool and rainy weather, and when ready for the market it was overstocked with peaches, pears, &c.

We notice by a trade circular that there arrived in New York in one day last week eighty four car loads of peaches, to say nothing of the large quantities of other fruits.

A great deal of the grapes shipped from here this season barely paid the expense of packing, shipping and commissions, and leaves nothing for collection.
