The immediate cause of death is not known. Mr. Davis was an Englishman by birth, but has been in this country for several years. He was, we learn, about 37 years of age and had for sometime carried on successfully a dairy farm. He was a most genial, kind hearted gentleman and enjoyed the confidence of a large circle of friends. We believe he married a daughter of the late Richard Finch, who was for many years teller of the old Bank of Cape Fear in Raleigh. Mr. Davis leaves a wife and several children besides an aged father to mourn their loss.
