Exposition Notes.

Next week is the fifth week of the Southern Exposition and it is now under full headway. Already thousands have been in attendance, viewing the many sights that are seen within the gates of this great Southern show and thousands are yet to come. It is the general verdict of the people that the Exposition gets better and better every day, as each day adds new attractions to the already large and interesting display of our resources. The program for next week will be one of the most interesting during the Exposition and visitors will miss a great deal if they are not present on these dates:

On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, the 26th, 27th and 28th, are the special days for Alabama. On these days addresses will be delivered by Hon. John G. Harris, State Superintendent of Public Education of Alabama; Milton A. Smith, Esq., editor Anniston, Ala.; Daily Hot Blast and Weekly Times; Dr. LeRoy Brown, President of the Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical College, and other prominent speakers from that State.

On Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the 29th, 30th and 31st, are the special days for Mississippi. On these days some of the most prominent men from that State will be present and will address the people. Mississippi has one of the best and most sound exhibits on the grounds and is well worth seeing.

October 29th, 30th and 31st are also special days for Southern manufacturers. A large number of prominent Southern manufacturers have consented to be present on these days. His Excellency, Thos. M. Holt, Governor of North Carolina, and one of the most successful cotton goods manufacturers in the South, will deliver the opening speech and address of welcome. Every community or town that is thinking of engaging in the manufacturing business should send a delegation of its most practical business men to meet with the Southern manufacturers, as they will get much valuable information.

Dr. R. D. Gatling, the inventor of the famous "Gatling gun," has written to Gov. Holt that he will arrive in Raleigh on next Tuesday, the 27th, for the purpose of visiting the Exposition. He will deliver an address in the Exposition building on Wednesday, the 28th. Mr. Gatling is a native North Carolinian and an immense crowd should assemble to do honor to this distinguished man, whom the old North State is proud to claim as her own.

The English Comedy Company appeared at Ford's last night in "She Stoops to Conquer" and "Poor Pillivoddy." The house was large and brilliant, several notabilities being present. Goldsmith's old play was given with delightful humor and spirit. The staging was in close accordance with the time, the interior of Mr. Hardcastle's house being particularly good. The rustic English tavern was also a faithful reproduction of such hostleries a century and a half ago. The acting last night was smooth and finished to a high degree. Miss Martha Ford appeared as Miss Hardcastle, one of the most difficult characters in the range of English comedy, since it requires the nicest discrimination. The refinement and delicacy of the performance evoked especial comment. She appeared to the best advantage in the "bashful scene" with young Marlow and in the barmaid scene with the same personage. The arch and quiet humor and sweet coquetry of the character were admirably sustained. Mr. Clarke was the Tony—the shrewd, awkward, good natured booby of the Hardcastle family—and gave a droll and consistent interpretation of the part. His scene of the stolen jewels with his mother was capital.

Meeting Last Night

Quite a large number of the citizens committee were present last night at the Mayor's office, and there was a lively interest manifested in the proper entertainment of distinguished visitors who come from a distance on the invitation of the citizens and the Exposition managers, as well as the extending of suitable invitations.

It was stated that Dr. Richard Gatling, the great gun inventor, will visit the Exposition on the 27th. Messrs. P. Cowper, Dr. G. W. Sanderlin, W. G. Upchurch, T. C. Williams and J. M. Broughton were appointed a committee to receive him and provide for his suitable entertainment.

On motion, the Mayor was directed to appoint a committee of ten gentlemen to go to Washington and invite President Harrison to visit the Exposition at such time as will suit his convenience. This committee will be announced hereafter. The same committee will also call upon ex-President Cleveland and invite him to come. The Mayor was made chairman and Senator Ransom was requested to act with the committee to secure the attendance of these distinguished gentlemen.

Two committees were appointed, one to visit the Exposition grounds on Monday and the other on Friday of each week and aid the Exposition management in looking after the comfort and entertainment of visitors, &c. The committee for Monday are Messrs. N. B. Broughton, W. E. Ashley and J. C. Ellington, and the committee for Friday are Messrs. W. S. Primrose, J. C. Scarborough and W. H. Worth. These committees are to counsel and aid the managers in arranging the weekly programs and in mapping out the business for each week for the furtherance of the objects of the Exposition. It was suggested that each member of the committee of fifty should act as aid to the managers in giving visitors information, and looking after their comfort and entertainment while on the ground or in the city, and that each wear a badge so that visitors and others may recognize them as persons to whom they may apply for information and attention. All of this was agreed to, and the badge to be worn will be provided by Mr. N. B. Broughton and Mayor Badger.

This meeting was a very spirited one, and no doubt will result in much good, especially in looking after and extending proper and pleasing recognition to visitors at the Exposition and in the city.

The committee of fifty are to meet each Friday evening at the Mayor's office until the Exposition closes.
