

Guilford Battle Ground.

The Greensboro Record says: "The Maryland Historical Society sometime ago resolved to erect a monument on the Guilford Battle Ground Park, to commemorate the heroic conduct of the Marylanders on the sanguinary battle field of Guilford C. H. in 1781. At a meeting of the society, held in Baltimore last Monday night, a report of the committee was accepted. It recommends the erection of a boulder monument 6 feet in length, 4 feet wide and 4 feet high, to cost \$350. The money to be raised by a valuable acquisition to the memorial stones already upon these sacred grounds."

The Suspended Bank.

The following from the President of the First National Bank of Wilmington which recently suspended will prove of interest:

The causes which led to the suspension of the First National Bank have existed a long while. The capital was impaired by heavy losses several years ago, as is generally understood from the fact that no dividends have been declared since 1887.

The Directors hoped that by careful and conservative management the earnings of the Bank would be sufficient in a few years to cover these old losses; but slow collections, in consequence of the general stringency prevailing in our section this fall, have compelled them to abandon this hope and close the Bank to protect the depositors, as well as the stockholders, against further risk. Notwithstanding the shrinkage in value of many securities on account of the general depression in business, it is hoped that the resources of the Bank under prudent handling will yield more than enough to pay the depositors in full.
