**The Wilmington Bank.**  
 We talked with a gentleman last Saturday afternoon from the Cape Fear section who seemed somewhat familiar with the status of affairs of the First National Bank of Wilmington, lately suspended. He says there is very little, if any, apprehension on the part of the stockholders of the Bank, as to its ability to meet all the liabilities to depositors. He is of the opinion that the suspension of the bank was a prudent move, but for which serious consequences might have ensued. Hon. Daniel L. Russell will probably be appointed receiver, and the affairs of the institution will be arranged with all possible dispatch.
