Badly Needed.

No person who wishes to purchase real estate, is likely to do so, until the title is made to appear all right, and, the proper way to find out about this, is to examine the records of the Register of Deeds office. To do this, it is almost absolutely necessary to have a proper index book. It would be an almost endless task to look up records by searching each book of entry with no date as to the number of the books, or the pages on which deeds are recorded. The old index book has become so torn and useless that it is almost out of the question for it to be used to advantage.

Now, it is the duty of the Board of County Commissioners to look into this matter and apply the remedy at once. It is a convenience to which the people of the county are entitled.
