A Plague of Rabbit.

The mild winters for the past three years have had the effect of greatly multiplying the rabbits in Montgomery county, Ind., and they are doing untold damage to fruit trees, bushes and crops. Farmers are going out in bands and putting in whole days exterminating the pests. A four side march hunt has occurred in Ripely township, in which over 1,600 rabbits were killed. The winning side killed 538 in the afternoon drive. Similar drives are being participated in all over the section.
