Warm wave expected soon.

Over two hundred students were present at the opening of Chapel Hill University yesterday.

We are pleased to learn that the prospects for the establishment of the Y. M. C. A. here, on a firm basis, are good.

A department of elocution has been established at the State University, with Prof. L. R. Hamberlin, of Richmond, Va. as instructor.

The general tendency in this section is for a considerable reduction in the acreage of cotton. More cereals are demanded.

Weather Bulletin.
Synopsis of the weather for the 24 hours ending 8 p. m. yesterday:

The clearing condition has moved from Texas to Florida, and dominates the weather on the Atlantic coast. Another storm accompanied by snow prevails in the upper lake region, and is causing warm southerly winds throughout the Mississippi valley.

In this vicinity the weather will continue fair Friday and probably Saturday, becoming warmer.

New Postal Cards
