Signs of the Weather at 8 P. M. Yesterday.

High of low pressure extends from St. Lawrence to the middle Gulf coast. The center of the storm lies over southern Louisiana. It is causing rain in the Atlantic States and snow in the Mississippi valley.

The severest cold wave of the season is moving down from the north west, the temperature being below zero over Iowa and Kansas. The cold wave will reach the Atlantic states probably Wednesday evening.

Local forecast for Raleigh and vicinity: on Tuesday rain, becoming colder tonight, rain may change to snow before morning.

An Auditorium.

There can be no mistaking the tone of public sentiment in Raleigh, on the subject of an auditorium, or a building of such dimensions as to accommodate the large crowds that occasionally attend on certain public occasions. It is conceded that in this respect, our city is behind others of its size. In fact we are sadly defective. We speak advisedly when we assert that we have been given the go by, by some of the best companies of theatrical performers, as well as amusements of other kinds, owing to the inadequate hall arrangements at command. We had hoped that the scheme proposed some time since, by some of our municipal officials would have been carried out before now, but it appears that there are legal drawbacks which will prevent any action in that direction. It will therefore be incumbent upon some private enterprise to start the movement, if it is carried out. In this connection, we must think that the time is not far distant when some of our citizens of means will be convinced that the scheme will present such favorable aspects as to ensure pecuniary success. Opera houses, or auditoriums have certainly proven successes in other places, and, surely there should be no good reason, why Raleigh, the capital of the State should be an exception.

We hope the matter will not be allowed to slumber. With the other improvements that now appear will crown the present year, let there be added a fine opera house or auditorium. It will be in keeping with the march of progress, that is everywhere visible in our beautiful city.

Little Rock.

Vernona Jarbeau and her splendid company were introduced to a large audience at the Capital Theater last night. No attraction has been here this season that has aroused so much enthusiasm or provoked so much laughter as this excellent aggregation of artists. The performance of the company, taken collectively or individually, pleased every part of the house. The applause was spontaneous and continuous. "Starlight" is a musical farce comedy, exactly what the bill proclaims it to be. Nobody cares what the plot is, and if he did, he would never have time to either analyze or understand it, for his attention would be too busily occupied in laughing at and applauding the specialties of the performers. Jarbeau was suffering last evening from a severe hoarseness which interfered somewhat with her singing, but even with this handicap she pleased and delighted her auditors. Her style is original, and to compare her work with that of some other soubrette, one must wait until she has an imitator competent to excel her in her specialties, and none such has yet appeared on the American stage. She is a very graceful dancer, has a charming voice and possesses a great deal of comedy talent of a character far above those who graduate from the variety stage and embark into the legitimate channels of the profession. There is nothing about her work that needs fumigation. Every member of her company does something creditable during the performance that demands an encore. Everybody who witnessed the entertainment last night went away delighted.

The R. and D. Takes Care of the Ministers.

Ministers' permits over the Richmond and Danville Railroad for 1891, are extended and made good until Jan. 31, 1892, by which time the new permits for 1892 will be issued and in the hands of our clergy.

Heavy Failure.

Last evening about 8:45 o'clock the well known grocery and commission firm of Messrs. M. T. Norris & Co., at the corner of Wilmington and Martin streets, made an assignment to Mr. W. H. Pace, of the law firm of Pace & Holding. The liabilities are about \$25,709.69.

There are eight classes of preferences. In class 1 are the lawyers, Pace & Holding, W. H. Pace, being the trustee, \$450 for legal services; store rent and clerk hire, &c. In class 2 is the Citizens' National Bank, note, \$3,000, J. A. Norris surety. In class 3 are C. A. Gambrell & Co., Baltimore, \$403.50; E. N. Hale, \$165; W. P. Harvey, \$79.26; John Thompson & Co., \$308.28; G. W. Helme & Co., \$188.04; Baltimore United Oil Company, \$30; the total being \$1,104.10. The only debt in class 4 is to the Citizens' National Bank, (on notes), \$3,900. In class 5 is Mrs. C. A. Norris (note) \$6,500; and others, making \$6,993.34. In class 6 are E. B. Freeman & Co., of Baltimore, \$5,000 and the Pa'apasco Guano Company of the same city, \$1,667.70; making a total of \$6,667.70. In class 7 are W. Baker & Sons, \$636.59; Wyatt Earp, \$800; Raleigh oil mills, \$450; C. G. A. Voight (note) \$547. Thurbur, Whyland & Co. \$279.87; W. B. Baker & Sons, \$575; Mallory cherookee Co., \$55; Morris manufacturing company, \$83.50; Atlanta paper company, \$33.92; Wilson Cotton mills, \$37.50; G. W. Helme & Co., \$179.34; Elsas, Keller & Co., \$18.32. Sharp, Perkins & Co. \$191.65; Gambrell manufacturing Co., \$226.38; Davenport & Morris \$255.41; F. E. Patrick & Co., \$260.70; Sharp & Perkins, \$303.30; Baltimore United Oil Co., \$270.87, the total being \$1,944.54.
