#### \*\*\* BURN AND BE CLEAN.

Gerald McCarthy, N. C. Experiment station.

As the days grow warmer the spores of noxious funogi and the eggs and pupe of in urious insects which have lain dormant in the dead leaves, stalks and rubbish of last year's crops will waken into new life and stand prepared to attack the earliest growth of this season's crops. Formerly carefol and intelligent farmers and gardeners preferred to allow these rub bish piles to remain until they could he plowed under to furnish humus for the soil. The great increase of plant diseases in recent years renders this plan no longer safe. Humus must be supplied by other means than diseased and infectious rubbish.

Lose no time, then, in cleaning up your fields, gardens, orchards and vineyards, and burn all trash returaing the ashes to the land. Rememthat plants once intected by disease cannot be cured. Now is the chance for the "stitch in time."


