Mad Dogs.

The mad dog mania has again broken out in some sections of the State, and in the neighborhood of Summerfield, Guilford county, a regular scare is in progress. The Twin City Daily of last Saturday says:

About a month ago two wealthy sportsmen from New York, Rapallo and Davies by name, went to Summerfield to spend several weeks in hunting, carrying with them a young setter dog. Soon afterwards he exhibited signs of rabies and bit Rapallo, who was seized with violent hydrophobia and left at once for New York. The rabid animal bit another dog in the neighborhood, which was in turn seized with its nine days afterwards and bit three men, two children and a woman, when he was shot and killed. All the persons bit have been attacked with hydrophobia and a madstone has been sent for. Meanwhile there is great alarm in the community about the victims.
