### SYNOPSIS OF THE WEATHER.

The following is the synopsis of the weather at 8 a. m. today:

An extensive high pressure area prevails over the North Atlantic States which is spreading to the south and southeast. The weather is generally cloudy with northerly winds over the country east of the Mississippi river. The only rainfall during the past twenty four hours occurred at Norfolk, Wilmington and Little Rock.

A new storm is developing in the extreme northwest, the winds there having shifted to southeast with rising temperature.

The Duke and Blackwell factories in Durham were closed yesterday in honor of Washington's birthday.

Architects are engaged in drawing plans for remodeling the Calborne Hotel, at Durham, recently purchased by Col. J. S. Carr.

It is now stated that the full plans for the re-organization of the Richmond Terminal will not be developed before March 1st, next.

A meeting of the Directors of the Young Men's Christian Association took place in the Agricultural building this afternoon at 5 o'clock.

There was a slight increase in the receipts of cotton in this city today. There is no improvement in prices, however.

The foundation for another large cotton factory has been commenced at Haw River. It will be called the "Cottania" Mills.

The statement is made that most of the counties in North Carolina are in a good financial condition, and their warrants are generally cashed on their face value. This is a first rate showing.
