The man who has constantly to be informing the world around him of his own kindliness of spirit and of his large generosity; of how he loves to help the poor; feels so forgivingly toward his enemies, and all that, and yet finds himself annoyed whenever those he choses to call his enemies, are recognized or spo en of in a kind appreciative way, thef green eyed monster has possessed him and he don't know it. True self respect is founded on what we know, in our honest hours, of our own motives; not what we would have others to believe them to be, frequently. Self respect is respect for self.
