SYNOPSIS OF THE WEATHER.
 The following is the synopsis of the weather at 8 a. m. today:
 The storm on the Atlantic coast near Wilmington dominates the weather over the country east of the Blue Ridge. Rain and cloudy weather continues from New York down to Jacksonville, Florida. The rainfall is light everywhere. The storm will move up the coast today and be followed by clearing weather tomorrow. An extensive high pressure area and cold wave lies over the lake region, and will move eastward on Saturday or Sunday.

"My Partner" at Metropolitan Hall to night. Go and see it.
 In spite of the weather, the New Berne Fair is a great success.
 The registered brands of fertilizers on sale in the State up to date amount to three hundred.
 Regular monthly meeting of the W. R. Womble Truck Co., to night, at 7:30 sharp.
 The jury in the case of the bigamist, Wyde, at Greensboro, have rendered a verdict of guilty.
 Wake Superior Court for the trial of civil cases, commences next Monday.

 The State officials and others who returned from the Newberne Fair yesterday, report a most enjoyable time. They say the fair was the best yet held in that city.
 It is now arranged so that the street car conductors, alternately have a day off occasionally. This is all right. They deserve it.
 Superintendent Roberts is busily engaged in arranging plans for fixing up the capital square for spring and summer; various kinds of rare shrubbery will be obtained.
 With the stone at easy command the streets of this city in almost every instance should have good crossings. In muddy weather it is almost impossible to cross some of them without being mired to the shoe tops.

 The cotton receipts here, for the week ending yesterday afternoon were 362 bales against 259 for the corresponding week last year. The receipts to date are 21,009 against 32,923 for last season. There are now only 479 bales on platform.
 The proposition for a grand excursion to Norfolk on the occasion of the launching of the cruiser, "Raleigh" is fast growing in popularity. It is hoped that there will be a very large attendance, not only from our city, but from other parts of the State.
 A few hundred dollars of capital is all that is needed to start a canning factory on a moderate scale. Thus far, this promises to be a good fruit year, and it looks as if the business would be a paying one. There are many of these establishments in various parts of the State doing well. The jury in the case of Weitman Thompson, for the murder of W. W. Pearsall, wife and two children and burning the house over their dead bodies, on the night of December 23rd, 1891, returned a verdict of murder in the Superior Court at Smithfield, Johnston county yesterday. The prisoner was sentenced by Judge Connor to be hanged April 14th. The jury signed a paper recommending the commutation of the sentence to life imprisonment. The evidence was circumstantial, but, very strong.
