Outrageous Attack

Yesterday, in the neighborhood of Milburnie, this county, a colored man named Wm. Smith got into a dispute with a gentleman named Geo. Goodwin, well known in that vicinity. It seems that one of Mr. Goodwin's calves had gotten into a lot and was kept there awhile, when Mr. Goodwin desired to take the calf, Smith charged him \$3.50 for it, which he refused to pay, offering him the legal fee. During the dispute, Goodwin walked off, when Smith threw a rock at him knocking him down. He also kicked him in a brutal manner. Although Mr. Goodwin is reported as seriously hurt. Smith when arrested was put under only a \$200 bail. The affair has created considerable sensation, especially on account of the bail as it is uncertain how the injuries of Mr. Goodwin may terminate.
