CITY IN BRIEF.

Farmers hard at work.
 Thus far, March has failed to show any of its rough propensities.
 The electric light system at the Insane Asylum is working finely.
 It is officially announced that the cruiser "Raleigh" will be launched the 31st of this month.
 The annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the Insane Asylum will be held next Wednesday.
 The official call for the Democratic State nominating convention will be made in about ten days.
 Superintendent Hall, of the electric street railway has resigned, to take effect in April.

 The sidewalk on Martin street opposite the old Tucker mansion is being cut down and nicely arranged. It will be a great convenience.

It will furnish a beautiful drive to the park, provided Superintendent MacMackin will put a coating of gravel over it to prevent vehicles from being stuck fast in the red clay soil. We suppose, of course, he will do this.
