SYNOPSIS OF THE WEATHER.

The following is the synopsis of the weather at 8 a. m. today:

The clearing condition lingers over Florida. Warmer, fair weather, with southerly winds, prevails over the Atlantic and East Gulf States.

The storm, yesterday observed over Kansas, has separated into two parts, one part moving northeastward to New York; the other southeastward to Louisiana.

Cloudy weather, with occasional rains, prevails in the Mississippi and Ohio valleys.

A high area, with moderate cold wave, lies over the upper Lake region.

Our Insane.

We have been shown a pamphlet entitled "An appeal for State care for all the Insane" prepared by Dr. Isaac M. Taylor, assistant physician of the State hospital, Morganton, N. C.

Dr. Taylor estimates the number of insane in the State unprovided for at about 1,400. He gives many and proper reasons why North Carolina should make proper provision for this class of unfortunate, and declares that the longer it is delayed the greater must be the first outlay for their accommodation and support.

We must think, that the book will have much effect in producing a movement in the next General Assembly, favorable to more extended accommodations for the insane. It is a matter that must appeal to the humanity of our people.

Meeting of Aldermen.

Last night was the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Aldermen. Considerable business was transacted, of which the following is a synopsis:

The report of the finance committee was adopted.

The street commissioner recommended that the R. and D. Railroad place a bridge over the road where Cannon street crosses it and open up the road on the south side to Manly street. He also recommended the use of flat rails on the line of a street railway on Hargett and Dawson streets to Union depot.

Petitions were received from several parties relative to improvements of property, &c.

The resignation of Alderman Grimms was laid on the table for the present. The matter of charity prescriptions was referred for investigation to the finance committee. The following resolution by Alderman Stronach, was adopted

Resolved, That the mayor appoint a committee on the part of the city government from the Board of Aldermen to act in conjunction with the citizens' committee in raising funds and furthering all plans; also that said committee are requested to be present on the occasion of the christening and presentation of the cruiser Raleigh.
