

"The Raleigh."

The Washington correspondent of the Baltimore Sun says: "Contrary to the usual custom, there will be no special excursion of officials from this city to witness the launching of the cruiser Raleigh at Norfolk, but the Navy Department will probably be represented by several of the bureau chiefs who may be able to combine business with pleasure by looking after matters relating to their respective bureaus at the Yard. It is said that Captain H. F. Glensay is slated for the command of the Raleigh when completed. He is at present in command of the receiving ship Franklin, at the Norfolk Yard."

A Needed Improvement.

Attention is called to the fact that water and sewerage connections are much needed improvements for St. John's Hospital, and an appeal is made to our people to help all in their power in securing them. Take Notice.

In order that there may be no misunderstanding relative to the matter, and as a warning to all parties concerned. We print the following section (1st) from chapter 886 of the laws of 1885:

"That it shall be unlawful for any person to sell or give, except for medical purposes, and upon the prescription of a physician, any intoxicating drink to any inmate of any of the penal or charitable institutions of this State."

Section 2, makes the violation of section 1st, a misdemeanor, on conviction of which offending parties are subject to fine or imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

Insane Asylum.

At a meeting of the Directors of the Insane Asylum, held yesterday, the following gentlemen were chosen as the Executive Committee for the coming fiscal year: J. B. Purvell, G. L. Kirby, B. F. Boykin. Mr. W. R. Crawford was re-elected Steward of the institution. Mrs. Ann Goodloe, who left the asylum temporarily on account of sickness in her family was again re-elected. The management of the institution was highly commended.

A FINE HOTEL.

H. C. Brown, of Denver, has now nearly completed the finest hotel west of the Mississippi river at a cost of \$1,500,000. He paid \$250,000 for the furniture and \$36,000 for the silver service. Yet when he landed in Colorado in 1859, he was without a dollar, and as the little mining camp was beginning to be built up he made his living by following his trade as a carpenter. He then took 160 acres of land at a spot near what is now known as Capital Hill at \$1.25 an acre. That lot today is worth \$5,000,000, and Brown is one of the richest men in the State.

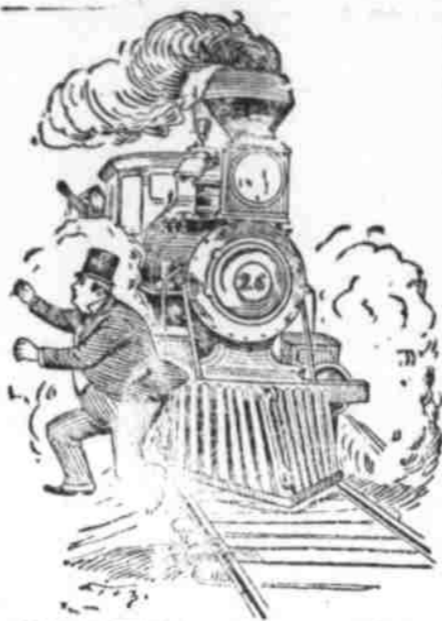

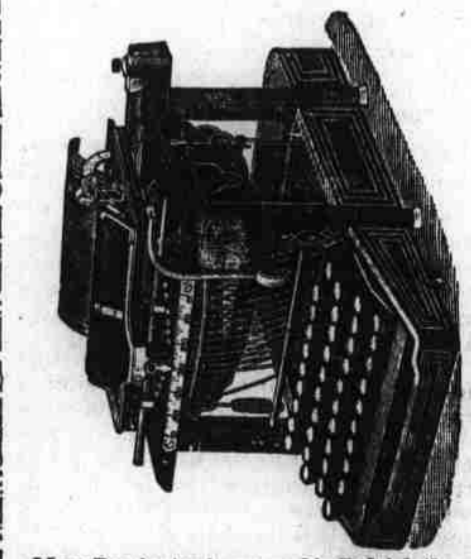
