In order that there may be no misunderstanding relative to the matter, and as a warning to all parties con cerned. We print the following section (1st) from chapter 386 of the laws of 1885:

"That it shall be unlawful for any person to sell or give, except for medi cal purposes, and upon the prescription of a physician, any intoxicating drink to any inmate of any of the penal or charitable institutions of this State."

Section 2, makes the violation of section 1st, a misdemeanor, on conviction of which offending parties are subject to fine or imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.
