The Origin

A friend from what is known as the "Rhaunkatte" section of Wake today suggested that it would be a good idea to tell what we know about the origin of the name. Just prior to the outbreak of the civil war Hon. David L. Swain informed us that the proper name of the locality was "Rausgata," after the town of that name in England. It was bestowed by Gov. Tryon on his march from New Bern to Hillsboro, his troops having camped on the site. From "Rausgata" the name became, in the parlance of the country, "Rhaunkatte." Tradition also says that the Tryon road passed directly through the site of the penitentiary, and the wheels of wagons can yet be seen on a rock just in rear of the Cameron residence on the Hillsboro road.

This article shall take effect and be in force on and after the 4th day of March, 1897."
