## SYNOPSIS OF THE WEATHER.

The following is the synopsis of the weather at 8 a. m. today:  
The storm has moved off the New England coast with a trough extending eastward to the lakes. Clearing weather, with west to northwest winds, prevails now over the Atlantic and Gulf States, with freezing weather down to Florida.

A second high pressure area has appeared in Dakota.  
The high area in the Gulf will drift slowly eastward, producing conditions favorable for fair weather for some days.  
It is slightly warmer in the Ohio valley, where the winds have shifted to southerly.

The next session of the Fayetteville Presbytery will be held at Pittsboro on April 13th.

The Turner-Holden case comes up again in Orange Superior Court next week.

At 3:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon Rev. K. D. Holmes will preach in Woodward's store on South Dawson Street. Sunday school at 2:30 o'clock.

The Wake County Sunday School met today at 10 o'clock in the lecture room of the First Presbyterian Church. The session is one of much interest.

If we are to have a centennial celebration in Raleigh next October, it is not too soon to agitate the matter. It should be on a grand scale, or not at all.

And now the Asheville Citizen proposes to raise a fund from the people of North Carolina for the purpose of purchasing a silver service to be presented to the new cruiser "Raleigh."

Several small white boys were up before the mayor this morning for taking coal from the yards near the depot. They confessed to the act and admitted that they sold it to parties residing in what is known as "The Bowery." The ages of the boys were such that it was a knotty question for the mayor to settle. He had warned them before. He reserved his decision for the present.

Mrs. James O. Thompson, died yesterday at the residence of her brother Dr. F. T. Fuller near this city, aged 32 years. Her death has caused the deepest sympathy of a large circle of relatives and friends. The funeral ceremonies took place from the residence this morning at 9:30 o'clock after which the remains were conveyed to Kittrell for interment in the family burial ground.

## Our Veterans.

Mr. W. C. Stronach has received instructions from Col. E. D. Hall, President of the Confederate Veterans Association to call the Executive Committee to Raleigh at an early day for the discussion of various matters. Among other things, the Wilmington Messenger says will be the appointment of delegates to attend the meeting of the veterans at New Orleans to take steps for calling and preserving the Confederate records of the civil war, to memorialize the legislatures of the several States of the late Confederacy to pension the old soldiers not able to take care of themselves, and to provide means of decorating the graves of Confederate soldiers who died in prisons and cities of the north during the war. The Executive Committee at this meeting will also take steps looking to another encampment of the Confederate Veterans of North Carolina at Wrightsville the coming summer.
