### Died.

Mrs. Nancy Gooch, a widow lady residing in the eastern outskirts of the city, died last night. She was over 100 years old and left a husband and four children. Mrs. Gooch was born in Oak Grove Township but lived most of her life in Raleigh. Her husband is said to be 93 years old. The funeral took place this afternoon at 5 o'clock. The remains were interred in the old city cemetery.
