SINOPSIS OF THE WEATHER. The following is the synopsis of the

weather at 8 a. m. today: A high area of considerable force has unexpectedly spread southeast from New England and covers the Atlantic States down to Florida. The highest barometer is resorted at New York, 80:52 inches. This high area has prevented the eastward movement of the storm in the west, and keeps the weather over the Atlantic

States cool and cloudy. The storm in the West has ad-vanced to Iowa, increasing in intensity. The pressure is 29.80 inches at Des Moines. Heavy gales prevail in the upper Mississippi Valley. This storm is likely to move over the Lakes today and tomorrow with destractive gales.

The weather is warm and generally cloudy in the Central Valley, with very little rain apywhere.


Board of Aldermen.


