### SYNOPSIS OF THE WEATHER.

The following is the synopsis of the weather at 8 a. m. today:  
A high area of considerable force has unexpectedly spread southeast from New England and covers the Atlantic States down to Florida. The highest barometer is resorted at New York, 30.52 inches. This high area has prevented the eastward movement of the storm in the west, and keeps the weather over the Atlantic States cool and cloudy.

The storm in the West has advanced to Iowa, increasing in intensity. The pressure is 29.80 inches at Des Moines. Heavy gales prevail in the upper Mississippi Valley. This storm is likely to move over the Lakes today and tomorrow with destructive gales.

The weather is warm and generally cloudy in the Central Valley, with very little rain anywhere.

The engine power of the new cruiser "Raleigh," is said to be larger than that of any other vessel of the United States Navy, with one exception. The actual weight of the ship when launched was 1,140 tons.

### Daring Escape.

The convict Poyd, who had been in the Charlotte jail for causing the wreck at Postian bridge, last August, has escaped in company with six others. It happened yesterday morning and the prisoners got away by digging a tunnel under the walls of the jail the night previous. A large force are endeavoring to capture the prisoners.
