Our Street Cars.

Mr. Huff, the new street car superintendent has arrived and entered on his duties. Last night he called a meeting of the employees at the power house, and gave directions as to the operation of the lines. Mr. Huff, we learn, proposes some important changes for the better. He proposes to shorten the hours of the conductors and motor men to twelve hours a day, taking the position that a man who is broken down at labor is not exactly fitted for work. From what we can gather the employees are much pleased with their new superintendent who has made a most favorable impression by his kindly words and his gentlemanly deportment. He comes among us fully determined to put new vim and energy into the service and to do all that is possible to make it profitable to the company and of convenience to the people. It is in contemplation to have a skating-rink in operation at the fair grounds this summer. A switchback railroad will also be kept in operation. At night the grounds will be lighted with electricity and everything done to make the place such a resort as will attract crowds for recreation and pleasure. Many improvements are also to be made at Brookside Park, which, as we understand it, is now under control of the street car company. We have learned nothing definite as to the course the company proposes to pursue as to Pullen Park, although we must think that due regard will be paid to the great advantages that beautiful locality will afford for pleasure seekers from the city. It is hoped that an early extension of the lines to the park will take place.

In a word we are to have a system of electric cars, which must commend itself to the favor of our people in all respects.
