The State Democratic Executive Committee, yesterday, unanimously adopted the following resolution, offered by R. M. Furman Esq.:

Saloon Keepers Clerks.
The decision of the Supreme Court, isto the effect that license is to be issued only to persons of good moral character. That the license is a personal trust, and the person so licensed is indictable for the sale of spirits to minors, or for its sale on Sundays whether such sale be made by himself or by his clerk. It is held that the license is responsible for criminal negligence in not preventing the illegal sale of liquors by clerks; that the person in whose name the license is issued becomes guarantor for their observance of the law. The principal is responsible for the acts of the agent in the conduct of the business placed in his hands. The case is State vs. Kittelle, from Mecklenburg county.
