NOW FOR IT.

Action of the Chamber of Commerce Last Night—A Grand Centennial Celebration Assured.

The call of the VISITOR for a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, has been something more than a "call of spirits from the vasty deep." The board has responded and nobly and promptly acted. They met last night, and there was a large attendance. An election of officers was held resulting in the choice of Mr. C. G. Latta for President, Col. E. G. Harrell, Secretary; Mr. H. H. Roberts, Assistant Secretary; Mr. Joseph E. Pogue, Treasurer; Dr. R. H. Lewis, First Vice President; Hon. Thos. Badger, Second Vice President; Third Vice President, Josephus Daniels Esq.

A committee was appointed to confer and co-operate with the Agricultural Society and the Chamber of Commerce relative to the centennial celebration of the city of Raleigh. The following constitute the committee: Messrs. P. H. Andrews, W. E. Ashley, Josephus Daniels, W. H. Hughes and A. A. Thompson.

President Battle, of the Agricultural Society, said that the grounds of the Society could be secured for the purpose of holding the children's jubilee in May next.

On the suggestion of Mayor Badger the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Chamber of Commerce of the City of Raleigh extend to the Norfolk and Western Railroad a hearty invitation to extend their line to Raleigh and that the railroad committee confer with the management of the line with a view to making this extension.

Rev. Dr. Carter and Prof. Kinealy were invited to address the Chamber next Tuesday night week.

On motion of Mr. Daniels, it was agreed to extend an invitation to Senator Carlisle, of Kentucky, to visit Raleigh upon the occasion of his visit to the University. The following committee to wait on Senator Carlisle were appointed: Messrs. Daniels, Battle, Badger, Ashley and W. N. Jones.
