CHINESE EXCLUSION.

The Universal Peace Union in executive session at Philadelphia has adopted resolutions opposing the Chinese exclusion bill pending in Congress. The union declares that it is a human right to live anywhere upon the earth in common with other persons, and says the exclusion of a whole nation is bad. This bill, it is urged, if made a law will break a solemn treaty, violate national faith, is severely prescriptive, and in a way never before visited upon any nation and is without limitation. It is opposed to the spirit of our institutions and the historical character of the country, will bring reproach upon the people and perhaps retribution, suffering and bloodshed.

It is urged that the exclusion of the Jews from Russia was no more than would be to expel Chinese from America. It is urged that the World's Fair cannot be represented if China is excluded, speaks of our trade and commerce with China and of the frugal, industrious habits of Chinese in this country. Officers of the union in Washington are urged to call upon the President and ask him to veto the bill should it pass the Senate, and also to use their influence with the Foreign Relations Committee against the bill.

DYNAMITE IN MADRID.

MADRID, April 13—Munoz, the Anarchist, was arrested today and was examined in prison by a Judge, who ordered a close watch on all the dynamite prisoners. A bag containing explosives, grenades and more formidable projectiles was found on Saturday night at the gate of the hospital for army pensioners.

The customary Palm Sunday services were omitted in the Royal Chapel today, ostensibly on account of the Queen Regent's indisposition, but really on account of Anarchist threats.

Further Anarchist arrests have been made in the provinces and in Bilbao.

AMERICAN FORTUNES ABROAD.

FRANKFORT, Germany, April 11—The Actionar, the leading financial paper here, attributes the increase in the gold reserves in the Reichs Bank and the Bank of England and France, to the silver law in America driving away gold. The Actionar says, that Gould, Mackay, and Vanderbilt are sending large parts of their fortunes to Europe in order to escape threatened losses through the depression in silver. The city of Madrid has entered into negotiations here for a loan of £4,000,000, offering to pledge certain excise receipts therefor, but it is doubtful whether the offer will be accepted.

A DIAMOND TRADE PANIC.

PARIS, April 11—The suspension of Bull & Co., private bankers, has precipitated the failure of Armand & Schwob, wholesale jewelers. D. L. Moppes, another big jeweler, has also stopped business. The liabilities of the firms are heavy. The whole extensive diamond and pearl trade of Paris is disorganized, partly through heavy speculation in diamond mining, and this is weakening values in the London and Continental precious stone trade.

MAD DOGS IN VIRGINIA.

ROANOKE, VA., April 11—Hydrophobia is reported to be alarmingly prevalent in Augusta and Rockingham counties. A large number of dogs that were found to be suffering with the malady have been killed, and it is feared that cattle and other stock have been bitten and will go mad.

The Graham court martial at Richmond, Va., adjourned yesterday. Commander Graham left for Annapolis to join his family. The members of the court are waiting orders for their departure.

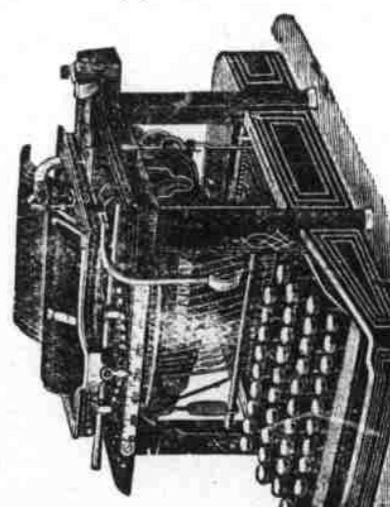
