We are glad to learn that the condition of officer Lewellen has somewhat improved.

The heavy rains have rather dampened the spirits of the knights of the hook and line.

In the matter of fish and oysters alone there would be an immense benefit to this city if the Albemarle and Raleigh road were extended.

A special meeting of Seaton Gales Lodge, No. 64, I. O. O. F., is called for tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock sharp to attend the funeral of the late Mr. W. T. Woodward.

We are unable to trace them to any authentic source, but we are still of the opinion that circumstances have arisen, or will soon arise, which will prompt the extension of the road at an early day. At any rate we are far from being in despair concerning the matter.

Rev. Kenneth D. Holmes will fill the pulpit at Central M. E. Church tomorrow, morning and night.

We have frequent occasion to look over reports of officials, public documents, &c., from other cities and towns and among these we frequently see engravings of city halls, either completed or in course of erection. As a general rule, they are of fine style of architecture, well arranged with all modern improvements. Raleigh is now getting large enough for a new building of the kind, and we hope that only a few years will roll by before can have one. The present location of the officials of Raleigh is not exactly adequate to the wants of the city.
