Formal Opening.

Last night there was a formal opening of the rooms of the Young Men's Christian Association at their beautiful and well arranged quarters, corner of Fayetteville and Morgan streets. There was quite a large crowd present, all of whom were most cordially greeted by the genial president of the association, Dr. Richard H. Lewis, aided by the secretary Mr. Western R. Gales. Among those present were many ladies. A short description of the different departments may not be uninteresting. The parlor is situated on the first floor of the building and is admirably furnished in oak with carpeting and papering of a superior kind. From this room, there is an opening into the reading department, which is arranged in an excellent manner and well lighted. It is bountifully supplied with books of rare merit and most interesting character. There are also an abundant supply of periodicals, newspapers, &c. On the second floor there is a nice, large room for noon prayer meetings, bible study, &c. For those who are so disposed, there is a room set apart for smoking purposes. The room for assemblies is situated in the third story, containing about a hundred seats. It has a platform and an organ, exclusive of one in the parlor. There are provisions on foot for the erection, outside of the main building, of an annex in which will be located a gymnasium, bowling alley, back-room, &c.
In a word, the opening was a success, and the interest manifested gives assurance that it will become a lasting institution for good in our midst.

THE EXERCISES.

In accordance with a pre arranged program the opening commenced with music and prayer by Rev. Mr. Cole, after which Dr. Lewis delivered a short address referring to the past efforts of the association and its future prospects. He was followed by Rev. J. L. Foster and Rev. Mr. Cole in stirring remarks. A beautiful and impressive solo was rendered by Miss Graves, of Peace Institute, and then a Gospel hymn was sung. Dr. Lewis announced the standing committees for the year.
