CITY IN BRIEF.

A new plug factory has been started in Durham.

Rev. W. B. Wingate has resigned the pastorate of the Baptist Church at Greensboro.

Rather a cold snap is prevailing in the Northwest, and we may get a little of it here.

Prof. Melver, State Superintendent of Public Instruction is engaged in visiting the different normal institutes of the State.

It has been decided by the Raleigh School Committee that the graded schools of this city will close the spring term on May 20th.

The regular meeting of the Epworth League of Edenton Street Church will take place in the bible class room tonight at 8 o'clock.

There are no arrangements, so far as we can learn, for public exercises at the close of the session of the graded schools.

Senator Williams of Pitt is booked as a candidate for State Auditor before the Democratic nominating convention.

The stereopticon exhibition has been postponed until next week. The precise time will be given hereafter.

The game of baseball last Wednesday at Winston, between the University and Davis school teams, was won by the former by a score of 6 to 2.

Died.

He had been sick for some time with typhoid pneumonia. He leaves a wife and five children to mourn their loss. The funeral will take place from the residence at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Report.

We have not had time to make more than a hasty examination of the recent annual report of the North Carolina Railway Commission, but it is a most interesting document. It shows that there are forty seven rail ways in operation with a total length of 3,452 miles. There are roads penetrating all the counties except twelve. The taxable property of the roads assessed by the commission is \$18,500,000, the funded debt \$38,500,000 and the current liabilities \$3,900,000. The gross earnings for 1891 were \$8,600,000, and operating expenses \$5,590,000.

Epworth League.

No more potent agency for good has been devised than that of the "Epworth League," which has recently been established among the young people of the southern Methodist church. Although but little more than twelve months old, its membership has already passed beyond fifty thousand, and is still increasing with marvellous rapidity. In many states, state conventions are being held, and a national conference is proposed for 1893.

The plan of organization is said to be a capital one, and, wherever the League has been established, the young people are being trained in systematic christian work, and all branches of the church and Sunday School are receiving an impetus forward from its labors.

We are glad to learn that two Leagues are in successful operation in this city, one at Central and one at Edenton St. Methodist church. An important meeting of the League at the latter church will be held to night at 8 o'clock.

Mrs. Ballard's Death.

We were unable to give yesterday anything more than a short notice of the death of this lady, which took place last Wednesday.

The following particulars will be read with sad interest by her many friends in Raleigh. We condense from the Globe of yesterday afternoon as follows:

"Mrs. Ballard formerly lived in Raleigh, where she was active in all good works and was loved and admired by all who knew her.

In Durham, where she has spent the past ten or twelve years, she has been conspicuous in social circles and in all undertaking having for their object the good of the town, the church or any worthy organization, she was an active worker and an acknowledged leader.

Mrs. Ballard had long been a consistent member of the Methodist church, and died sustained by a christian's hope. In church work as in other things she was always in the lead and will be much missed.

The suddenness of this call adds additional sadness to her death. A slight cold contracted a week ago gradually developed alarming symptoms, resulting last night in death. It was between 7 and 8 o'clock that the spirit took its flight to the land of eternal day, just as the shadows closed about the earthly tenement, spreading the pall of a great sorrow over the hearts of those who watched at her bedside.

The funeral services took place this afternoon at 4 o'clock from Main Street church, of which she was a member, and the remains were laid to rest in the city cemetery by the side of those who have gone before.

The floral offerings were many and beautiful, a fitting emblem of a pure and useful life.
