Board of Aldermen.

The regular monthly meeting of the board was held last night.

We notice the following as the most important business transacted. Two propositions for lighting the city were submitted. Mr. Hawkins proposed to furnish are electric lights, like those now used at \$80 per lamp, per year, to burn every night all night, contract for five years; also to furnish gas for street lights for the same period at \$1.50 per 100 feet, the city at no time during the contract to use less than 100 lights.

A proposition was made by the Fort Wayne Electric Light and Power Company, to furnish 25 or more are lamps of 1,200 candle power for \$75 per lamp, per year, or 107 or more 50 candle power lights at \$36 per light, per year, the contract to extend over a period of five years.

The proposal of Mr. Hawkins was adopted.
