Memorial Day.

A considerable crowd of Odd Fellows left today to attend the Grand Lodge in Wilmington.
The meeting of the Chamber of Commerce has been postponed until next Friday night at 8:30 o'clock.
At our time of going to press the weather was quite unfavorable for the memorial services.
President Chadwick, of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad, is in the city.
All the old officers of the Governor's Guard were, last night, chosen by acclamation.
Cars will be put on the Hargett street line the latter part of the present week.
There were fifteen confirmations at the Church of the Good Shepherd last Sunday.
A game of baseball between the Universities of North Carolina and Virginia, was played today in Richmond.
The water works system is to be extended as far as the N. C. car works on the Raleigh and Gaston Railroad.
Maj. Graham Daves, who was Private Secretary for Gov. Ellis, in the "times that tried men's souls," is in the city.
The opening of bids for the new dormitory to be erected at the Agricultural and Mechanical College has been postponed until Friday, May 13th, at noon.
A reception, complimentary to Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Jackson, will be given by Mr. and Mrs. Josephus Daniels, at the residence of Mrs. Bagley, tomorrow evening from 6 to 10 o'clock.
Col. Wm. Johnston, of Charlotte, and his daughter, Mrs. Col. A. B. Andrews, have gone to Memphis, Tenn., to attend the ceremonies of opening the new bridge over the Mississippi river at that point.
Blanks are being sent out by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to County Treasurers and Superintendents, and the law requires them to report by the first Monday in July.
The commencement exercises of the Ohwan Baptist Female Institute at Mufreesboro will take place May 31st and June 1st. The baccalaureate sermon will be preached by Rev. R. Vandeventer, of Henderson, and the literary address by Hon. W. W. Kitchin.

Prof. Holmes is now in the Rolesville section, where, it seems, he has examined specimens of shell rock said to be very valuable in the way of lime making. There is said to be large quantities of the rock in that part of the county.

Died.

Our citizens, or most of them, remember Geo. Bushyhead, a somewhat notorious Indian who often visited Raleigh. He was a preacher and was in attendance on the Baptist Convention at Atlanta. Last Friday he was found in a dying condition on a street in that city and taken to the Providence infirmary where he died yesterday and his body had been prepared for burial and was held subject to the order of the convention. Rev. W. L. Brown, Dr. D. T. Millard and R. A. Centelle, of North Carolina, were appointed a committee to look after the burial of the deceased minister.
