The old Arsenal looks well with its new coat of paint. Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Boushall have returned from a trip to Atlanta, Ga. Rev. Chas. Dixon will lecture on "Fools" in Charlotte tonight. Several excursions are talked of soon. One of these is a proposition to visit the capital of the nation. Memorial day was well observed in many of the cities and towns of the country. North Carolina 6 per cent. bonds are now quoted at 123. The 4 per cent. consols are selling at 99. The new Union depot can now be said to be undergoing the finishing touches. We learn that the committee to make arrangements for the place at which to hold the Democratic State Convention will meet this afternoon at 5 o'clock. It seems now to be the understanding that the convention will be held in Stronach's warehouse, where it took place in 1883. In order that there may be no doubt about the matter, we state as our understanding of it, that the county convention of the Democratic party which meets here next Saturday, will nominate delegates to the State convention that meets in this city on Wednesday, the 18th inst. Our Governors.

Leaving out the proprietary Governors, Richard Caswell was the first, having been chosen by the General Assembly of 1776. Alexander Martin was the fourth Governor, having been elected in 1793. He was from Guilford county and was succeeded by Richard Caswell of Lenoir, in 1794, but was again elected in 1799.
