A rumor has been revived, to the effect that the offices of the Raleigh & Gaston Railroad Company, or rather the Seaboard Air Line system, would soon be removed from this city to Atlanta, Ga. We must think that the rumor had its origin in a statement taken from an Atlanta paper, which says that quarters were being fixed up for officials of the Seaboard Air Line. This, however, is mere surmise on our part, and there is no way for the press to arrive at the matter, unless from statements of the proper authorities, which, probably they do not feel called upon to make. We can only hope for the best. It would be a blow at Raleigh, if the offices were removed and, a still worse one, if the machine shops were carried away.
