DEEP WATER CONVENTION.

Special. MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 13—Two noted bodies of men are meeting here today, in fitting sequel to yesterday's great opening. These are the deep water convention and the society of American engineers. To the first name every western and southern State has sent the delegates named by the governors and all of them are enthusiastic in the work before the organization. The agitation for improvement of western waters will take in the shape of a memorial to Congress, and probable the appointment of a Congressional Committee to look after the interests involved. The Society of American Engineers is holding its annual session and an interesting series of papers is being read. This evening there will be a display of fireworks from floats anchored in the river. The designs for this pyrotechnic display cost \$3,000 and represent events of momentary interests in connection with the great celebration of the week. This will be followed tonight by the grand banquet at which 500 covers will be laid with Senator Harris as presiding officer. It is expected that Senators Vest, Butler, Gordon and Crisp will speak.

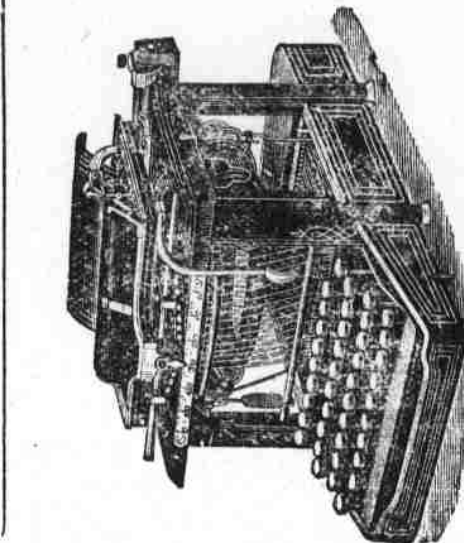
