## A Faithful Servant.

Lizzie Thomas, colored, who had been in the employ of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Alford of this city for near eighteen years, died on Friday night, May, 13th, 1892, after a long and painful illness. She was a faithful family servant. While a slave, she belonged to the late Maj. John Thomas, living near Cedar Rock, Franklin county, in whose family she received training for the service to which she was so well fitted. As such servants drop into the grave, relics of the "Old South" are gone, and their like will not be seen any more. She was supposed to be about sixty seven years of age.

## Epworth League.

The meeting of Epworth League at Edenton Street Church last night was well attended and thoroughly enjoyed. After the necessary time was given to the routine business, several short talks were made about Methodist women of the early days, and several sweet songs were sung.

We are glad to learn that this league is doing good work. Nearly all of its departments are now well organized and are doing effective service. The literary and social departments have held several church receptions which have been occasions of much enjoyment to the large crowds that attended. ## County Convention.

The convention of democratic delegates from the various townships of Wake county, met in Metropolitan Hall today at noon, and was called to order by Mr. W. C. Stronach, chairman of the County Executive Committee. All the townships were represented and there was a large majority of what are termed "straight out" Democrats. Much time has been consumed in organization as there were contests in several of the townships. There are between 189 and 190 delegates.

Mr. Stronach stated that this was a Democratic Convention and he hoped that harmony would prevail.

Representatives of Democratic press were chosen secretaries.

Mr. J. C. Caddell, of Wake Forest, was chosen assistant secretary.

The roll of townships was called, and all found to be represented. There was a contest from Holly Springs and Swift Creek, which was referred to a committee on credentials.

Mr. Otho Wilson attempted to speak, but was ruled out, as he was not yet decided to be a delegate. After the committee on credentials reported, the convention adjourned for one hour.
