A large number of our citizens are in attendance at the Episcopal Convention at Greensboro. The session commenced this morning.

The closing exercises of Apex High School will take place Thursday, May 26th. Annual address by Prof. J. B. Carlyle, of Wake Forest.

The new Trinity church at Durham has been commenced. It will cost \$25,000 and is expected to be the finest religious structure in North Carolina.

The executive committee of the Board of Agriculture met yesterday. Mr. Peter M. Wilson, chairman of the World's Fair committee, was present and made an interesting report.

It is reported here, today that the Seaboard Air Line system has gained its point in the matter of full admission into "the shed" at Atlanta, Ga. Hope it is true.

Members of the Y. M. C. A., should bear in mind the opening of the gymnasium tonight. No member will be allowed the exercises without slippers—remember that.

Ex-Governor St. John, of Kansas, will address the citizens of Durham and surrounding country on May 20th. His subject will be prohibition, labor reform, finance, tariff, &c.

The outside pressure from a distance, is greater here than ever known before on a similar occasion. It is estimated that there are, at least, five hundred visitors in the city, who are not delegates.

Met at noon today and was called to order by E. J. Chambers Smith, Esq., chairman of the State Executive Committee.

It is perhaps the largest convention of a political character that has ever assembled in North Carolina. In common with our people generally we hope that its actions may be as harmonious as possible, and that they may redound to the interests of the people of the State.

It will hardly be so that we can give in our issue today anything like an extended account of proceedings, as the body will not, we presume, organize before our time of going to press. At this meeting there is no indication as to who will be permanent chairman.

The convention was temporarily organized at 12 o'clock by appointment of L. S. Overman, of Rowan, chairman, and Robt. M. Furman, secretary.

Large majority of committee on permanent organization are straight out Democrats.
