### Invitation.

Maj. C. D. Heartt, our efficient Chief of Police, has received a beautifully gotten up card of invitation to attend the annual parade and review of the police force of the city of New York at the Worth Monument, Madison Square, Fifth Avenue and Twenty-Fifth street, Tuesday, May 31st, 1892, at 4 o'clock p. m. The invitation is signed by Wm. H. Kipp, chief clerk, and admits the chief of our police to the review stand. We would like very much if Maj. Heartt could avail himself of the invitation, but his official duties will probably prevent it. He would represent Raleigh in fine style—no doubt about that.

### Funeral.

The funeral services of the late Mr. C. H. Lowellyn took place this afternoon at 4 o'clock from the Baptist Tabernacle church, and were attended by a large concourse of relatives and friends. The ceremonies were conducted under the auspices of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, of which order the deceased was a prominent member. The sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. J. W. Carter, of the First Baptist Church, and was most impressive. The floral decorations were numerous and beautiful. The police and other officials of the city turned out in force as a testimony of the high esteem entertained for their late comrade. The interment was made in Oakwood cemetery. The pall bearers were as follows: Odd Fellows, N. B. Broughton, George L. Tonnofski, J. W. Beasley, J. E. Pogue; city of Raleigh, Mayor Thos. Badger and Chief of Police C. D. Heartt.

### County Commissioners.

At a meeting of the magistrates of Wake county, to be held next month, the new board of county commissioners will be chosen. In order that the public may know what the present board has accomplished during their term of service, the following circular has been sent to the justices:

"When the present board came into office December 1, 1888, the assessment for county purposes that year being 34 1/6 cents upon the \$100, there was in the treasury \$7,000 98, and outstanding debts due by note to the bank and Miss Rogers for the purchase of the poor house land, amounting to about \$7,100. The year 1897, from which a portion of this money came, being an assessment year, in order that the conduct of the present board might be fairly tested the condition of the next assessment year, 1891, is given. The levy for 1891 for county purposes was 20 1/3 cents upon the \$100. All of the said notes for about \$7,100 have been paid since December 1, 1888, and there was in the hands of the county treasurer May 1, 1892, \$10,032 41 to the credit of the county, and this before a final settlement with the sheriff, and all of the indebtedness of the county has been paid except the \$25,000 of bonds issued in 1880, and the interest upon these bonds is promptly paid when due. As will be observed from the above, the board has endeavored to exercise such economy as in its judgment comporting with the stringency of the times. The mileage and per diem received by members of the board in 1897 amounted to \$978 77, the amount of mileage and per diem received by members of the present board in 1891, was \$323.80."
