BROOKSIDE PARK.

Our Street Railway.

We availed ourself of the opportunity and the beautiful weather yesterday afternoon to visit Brookside Park, where, in company with that most estimable gentleman, S. W. Huff, Esq., superintendent of the Raleigh Street Railway Company, we had a most pleasant and interesting time. We found Mr. Huff occupied in superintending affairs at the end of Polk street, just at the entrance to Oakwood cemetery, where a curve in the railway is being built. From this point to the upper entrance to Brookside Park the cross ties have been laid and the extension of the road to the place will soon be an accomplished fact. The cars will be run through a most romantic portion of the grounds, crossing the dam. We are informed by Mr. Huff that if the arrangements now on foot are fully consummated, the extension of the line will be made through the property of the Oakdale Land Company, making a most beautiful and delightful circuit.

In the park, evidences of most energetic work are apparent on all sides. There is a perfect transformation in all the surroundings, and no more beautiful spot can be found anywhere for the summer enjoyment of our people. Several rustic bridges span the creek at different points. The pond is furnished with a boat for the entertainment of such as desire it. At several points rustic and comfortable seats for visitors are located. Swings for children are hung at different points, and everything is being done to render it second to but few pleasure retreats in this section of the country.

Mr. Huff says the street car company is fully determined to leave nothing undone to subserve the highest expectations of our people, and he fully hopes and expects that their efforts will be highly appreciated. As the receipts of the road justify it, there will be additional improvements and extensions, and it is most earnestly hoped that the receipts during the summer will enable the company to carry out some contemplated improvements.

We are much gratified at the tone of confident hope expressed by Mr. Huff as to the general outlook of the company as regards its efforts to give us a first class system. Of course it cannot be counted upon that the full measure of expectation can be realized without the lapse of time and proper returns. All agree that much has been done. There is room for still further and more extended progress. The system is here to stay, if energy on the part of those who control it and even a reasonable patronage will insure it. That this will be rendered, there is no room now to doubt.

And now we may be pardoned for a personal allusion. Mr. Huff came among us a young and comparatively unknown gentleman. He has made many friends in Raleigh, and his administration of the affairs of the company has been as perfect as possible under the circumstances. He is fully up to all the requirements of his position and personally superintends all the work possible. Our system of electric railway is second to none in the country, considering the size of our city. Let us rejoice at its progress and do all in our power to sustain it.

A Fine Excursion.

Accepting the very generous offer of the Raleigh and Gaston Railroad, the teachers and pupils of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb and the Blind went down to Franklinton yesterday on an excursion. The trustee is required to claim all exemptions allowed by the laws of North Carolina. The stock of goods will be exposed for sale at public auction.
