The Comet.

An eight tailed comet is now one of the attractions in the heavens during the early morning hours. It cannot be seen with the naked eye, but with a pair of good strong field glasses it is visible about 3 o'clock in the morning. It is called the Swift comet, after its discoverer, Prof. Louis Swift, of Rochester, N. Y., who first saw it on May 7th. From observations made through a powerful glass it is shown that the comet is most profusely decorated with tails, and outbursts in this respect the six tailed comet of 1774. It will be visible through field glasses and telescopes for at least two months. As the sun rises each morning its brilliancy will decrease.

The Holy Communion will be approached in procession, the candidates dressed in pure white, typical of that purity of intention which prompts the true Christian to the performance of such a responsible duty. The ceremonies throughout will be according to the Roman ritual, and will, with the other services of the day, be conducted by Rev. Father Marian the present pastor in Raleigh.
