A canning factory has been organized in Winston with a capital paid in of \$10,000. The outlook for a fine business is good. Why we cannot have such an industry in Raleigh is beyond our comprehension. Surely our financial citizens should put their shoulders to the wheel in such enterprises. The returns are sure.

The North Carolina Teacher for May is a number of unusual interest, containing much of educational value. It has a fine cut of Hon. John C. Scarborough, the democratic candidate for Superintendent of Public Instruction.

We hear commendations on all sides for Mr. A. Dughi at the admirable manner in which he managed matters in his line connected with the concert, banquet and other exercises at St. Mary's school. Mr. Dughi always performs his duty to the entire satisfaction of all who secure his services, and we know that his services at St. Mary's are very highly appreciated by Rev. Bennett Smedes and all others attached to the school.

The wheat and oats harvests are reported unusually fine.

The interior of the new Union Depot is undergoing the finishing touches in the way of painting, &c.

The commencement exercises of the Davis military school are now in progress. The annual address was delivered by Hon. R. A. Doughton.

A Pleasant Trip.

The excursion to Eden on Street M. E. Sunday school to Clarksville, Va., yesterday was a most enjoyable one in all respects. There were eight cars comfortably filled and the trip was made in good time, the party arriving at Clarksville at 11 a. m. Their reception by the citizens was cordial, and preparations had been made on an island in the Roanoke river for the entertainment of the visitors but the rain prevented this, and the crowd repaired to a pleasant grove near the outskirts of the town. Here the picnickers spread out their lunches and a good time generally was had. After this the crowd dispersed enjoying the scenery and the surroundings of the place which are very pretty as Clarksville is beautifully located. After a most delightful sojourn of about six hours and a half the train left for the return trip at 5:30 o'clock. All seemed to be delighted with the occasion and accord to the Clarksville people the highest praise for the generous reception given them.

Y. M. C. A.

The board of directors of the Young Men's Christian Association held their first regular meeting in their present building, yesterday afternoon at 6 o'clock.

The report of the treasurer, Mr. C. P. A. Barton, showed the association practically out of debt notwithstanding the large expense which has been incurred in fitting up and furnishing the rooms. The reading room is supplied with a very nice and attractive assortment of papers, periodicals and books. The amusement department is pretty well equipped, the board are laboring with the question of putting in water and bath and fitting up a tennis court in the rear; and nothing prevents their going right on with these needed improvements but financial deficiency and a prudent indisposition to go in debt. The gymnasium is one of the prominent attractions to the rooms, and Dr. Battle reported about enough subscribed to employ a gymnast instructor for one month.

The ladies auxiliary, of which Mrs. Dr. R. H. Lewis is president, are entitled to much of the credit for the attractiveness of the rooms and for the funds with which to pay for the same, as they have nobly assisted the board in their efforts.

The report of the general secretary, Mr. J. S. Atkinson, was interesting and instructive. It showed that there have been held since he has taken charge as general secretary 5 young men's meetings with an average attendance of 49; 2 boys' meetings with an average attendance of 27. There have been 27 noon day prayer meetings and four miscellaneous meetings. During these meetings there have been 13 requests for prayer. There have been an average of 73 visitors to the rooms per day.

The association is in good shape and is doing a good work.
