CLOUDBURST AT MONONGAHELA.

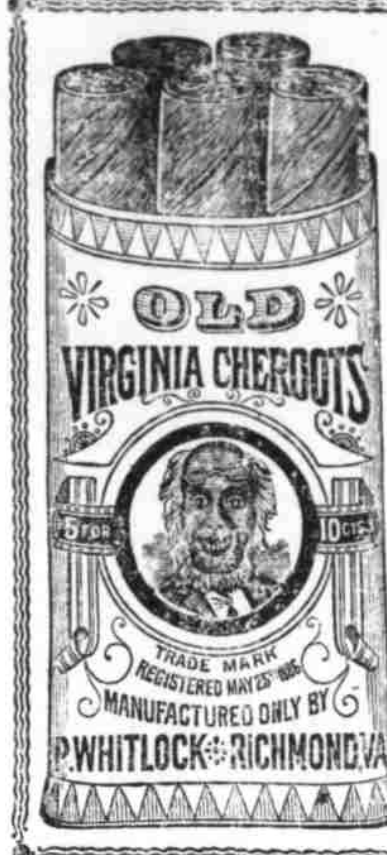
MONONGAHELA CITY, Pa. June 8.—Between 7 and 8 o'clock last evening a storm equal to a cloudburst broke loose here. Pigeon Creek arose with tremendous rapidity and force, and swept away the great bridge of the Pittsburg, Virginia and Charleston road, crossing the creek there. One of the piers of the bridge which crosses the Monongahela river here was washed away and the bridge is left in a dangerous condition. Masses of wreckage are observed passing here from Pigeon creek, including dismantled barns and sheds. It is reported that a boy was drowned at a ford crossing the creek, and that a dozen country bridges have been swept away and great damage in the farming districts.

A COLLEGE BOY DIED.

NEW HAVEN, June 8.—Wilkie Rustin, a Yale sophomore who took the junior society initiations last week, died last night at the initiation. Rustin, bitadfoiled was told to run down the street. He ran into a pole carriage and received an awful blow in the abdomen. He was in intense agony until his death.

CYCLONE IN TEXAS.

CLUBBURN, Texas, June 8.—Sunday night a cyclone struck this place demolishing 43 houses. Dr. Prescott and his wife were fatally injured, being crushed by their falling house. Several other persons were injured. Mineral Well and Lewisville were also visited by the storm.
