## CITY IN BRIEF.

A Republican ratification meeting will be held at the court house to night.  
The Agricultural department has prepared the crop bulletin from every county in the state.  
The shipment of Irish potatoes from the New Bern section is larger this year than ever before.  
Rev. Dr. T. H. Pritchard, now of Wilmington, but formerly pastor of the First Baptist church of this city, was here yesterday.  
The State Tobacco Association meets in Morehead City, July 5th, and promises to be very largely attended.  
The Rev. D. N. McLaughlin of Sanford will preach and administer the Lord's Supper at 11 a. m. and preach again at 8 p. m.  
We hope our 4th of July committee will not forget to press the matter of the trains running into the new depot. It would be a nice annex of the celebration.

The outlook of the girls industrial and normal school at Greensboro is splendid. It is expected that additional accommodations will be necessary at the opening session.  
Mr. J. W. Bailey, son of Dr. C. T. Bailey has been chosen editor of the "Student" at Wake Forest College for the educational year 1892-93.

Up to last Tuesday there had been one hundred and forty conversions and one hundred and twenty five backsliders reclaimed under the ministrations of Evangelist Fife at Goldsboro.

One of the most interesting cases that have come before the Federal Court at its present session was that involving the right of the city of Wilmington to compel the receiver of the wrecked National Bank to pay the taxes due by the institution. Judge Russell appeared for the receiver and Col. Thos. W. Strange for the city.

A meeting of Alliancemen favorable to a third party was held in this city today. An executive committee was chosen for the county of which Mr. S. Otho Wilson is chairman. Resolutions in respect to the memory of Col. L. L. Polk were adopted. There was a good attendance.

Can't we have a new town clock by the time of our centennial celebration? It would be a decided improvement to the market house building and of much advantage to our citizens. We hope the matter may find early favor at the hands of our City Fathers.

## Death of Col. L. L. Polk.

At 11:15 o'clock this morning, the distressing intelligence was wired to this city that the above named gentleman had just died at the Garfield Hospital in Washington, D. C., where he had been taken for the purpose of surgical treatment for bladder trouble from which he had been from time to time a great sufferer. While the announcement was not unexpected from previous reports, yet the sad event has caused the deepest regret in our midst.

Col. Polk, was a native of Anson county, but has been a resident of Raleigh for some time, with a few temporary exceptions. He was a gentleman of much energy and had seen quite an eventful career. At the time of his decease, and, for some time previous, he was President of the National Alliance and Labor Union of the United States, with headquarters at Washington. For the last few years he had become quite noted in a National point of view. Incidental to the great organization over which he presided, and it is thought by many of his friends that his constant duties aggravated the disease which finally proved fatal.

While our acquaintance with Col. Polk has always been cordial, and, perhaps intimate, we are not sufficiently well versed in matters pertaining to his public career to make anything like an extended notice at this time. He was the owner of the Progressive Farmer of this city, a journal which has, so far as we can judge, been most successfully conducted, and his tact in other spheres of life have been marked and successful. He leaves a wife, several children and many devoted friends to mourn their loss, who have our deepest sympathy in this, their hour of affliction. At this writing we are not informed of what arrangements are being made for the funeral, but anticipate that the remains will be brought here for interment.

## A Grand Occasion.
