## CITY IN BRIEF.

The cotton factory stock continues to boom

Many of the North Carolina delegation to Chicago will leave the latter part of this week. The clans are already gathering.

Mr. C. W. Lambeth, city clerk, has gone to Wilmington to attend the meeting of the Grand Lodge, Knights of Pythias.

Large additions are being made to the Commonwealth Cotton Factory in Durham. This looks like such industries are paying handsomely, and we are glad to note that another one is in contemplation for Raleigh.

Be on hand at 8:30 o'clock to night. The members of the Young Men's Christian Association will hold a meeting in the gymnasium. The object of the meeting is to arrange plans for a day of pleasure and amusement on Neuse river at an early day. A full attendance is requested.

The Teachers Assembly meeting at Morehead is close at hand. It will commence June 29th and will be a session of unusual interest. During the first three days, Mr. Beard, the famous "Chalk" artist and humorist, will be on hand, and many other attractions are billed. The attendance will no doubt, be very large.

A little colored boy, named Walter Hall, in attempting to build a fire with kerosene oil at the residence of his mother, Grace Hall, 210 West Levee street, was quite badly burned today at 12:48 o'clock. The fire alarm was sent out but the flames were quickly extinguished.

A very handsome catalogue has been sent out from the Horner school of Oxford, for the session of 1891-92. The number of pupils enrolled for the past scholastic year, was 141, a gain of 41 over any previous year and the largest percentage of increase made by any school or college in the State. ## Juvenile Offenders.

A most important meeting of the Board of Public Charities has been in session in this city for the past two days, and much business has been transacted. The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the secretary be requested to prepare a circular on the subject of the requisitions of the law in reference to the treatment and care of prisoners in all respects, and the management of the indigent in the county homes; also to embody such points in reference to the construction of buildings and the providing of conveniences for the health and comfort of the inmates of said jails and homes, as experience recommends and the honor and credit of the State require.

2. That the said circulars be sent to the visitors representing the board of charities, to the chairmen and board of commissioners of each county, to the sheriffs and superintendents of county homes and to the mayors and chiefs of police of each municipality of the State.

Steps were taken relative to the representation of the State at the Columbian Exposition.

The most important business of the board, was in regard to a plan for a reform or industrial school for Juvenile offenders. Messrs. W. N. Jones, W. A. Blair, L. J. Haughton and C. B. Denson were appointed a committee to consider the matter, and it is hoped that their efforts may result in something encouraging in the premises.
