### The Summer Sewing School.

For several years a number of the ladies of this city, feeling the need of some industrial training for the children of the town, have conducted a Sewing School. This year, this work has been placed on a more satisfactory basis than ever before. Old plans of work have been extended and new features added. Under the superintendence of Mrs. Mary Marsh, who has made a most successful record as a teacher in the Murphy school, the sewing school will open in the Centennial graded school, June 21st, at 9 o'clock. The school will be held from 9 to 11 o'clock, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays during June, July and August. To cover cost of materials used, a charge of twenty cents a month in advance will be made for each pupil. Girls from seven to sixteen admitted.

### The Asheville Excursion.

On Wednesday, July 6th, there will be an excursion to Asheville under the direction of Mr. Jas. A. Sanders, as manager. It will be, beyond doubt, one of the most enjoyable occasions of the kind that has yet taken place, and every comfort will be arranged for a delightful trip to the Switzerland of America. The train will leave Raleigh at 6:30 a. m., arriving at Asheville about 4:30 p. m., thus affording a view by daylight of the splendid mountain scenery. Returning, the train will leave Asheville at 9:30 a. m., Friday the 8th. The refreshment car will be well supplied with cooling summer drinks and eatables. An observation car will be attached for which an extra charge of \$1 will be made. Only 50 tickets will be issued for this car, so that those desiring them should make early application to the manager at Raleigh. The general fare from Raleigh for the round trip will be \$1.50; other places in proportion.
