**Have We Incendiaries in Our Midst?**

In our issue of yesterday afternoon we reported the fact that on the night previous a most dastardly attempt was made to burn the house occupied by Robt. E. Lancaster, on West Jones street, just in the rear of the residence of Capt. Ashe. The attempt was made while the family were absent at church, and but for their opportune return it would have proven a success. Feeling alarmed at the outrage, and deeming it best not to again run such a risk, Mr. Lancaster's wife determined last night to remain at her father's house, a short distance off. Between 9 and 10 o'clock last night an alarm was sent in from box 43, at the corner of Jones and Saunders streets, and soon sheets of flame were seen issuing from Mr. Lancaster's house. The fire department responded with usual promptness, but the fire had gotten so well under way that all efforts to get it into subjection failed, and the house together with its contents, were soon destroyed.

The circumstances surrounding this case are such as to cause the deepest indignation among our people coupled with suspense and even alarm. In our peaceful community such an outrage as this is almost unparalleled. That it was the work of some villain or villains of the deepest dye is apparent, and the whole power of our officials, aided by citizens, should be exercised to bring the offender or offenders to justice. It is indeed a fearful situation of affairs when a citizen cannot leave his premises even for a short time without being subjected to the torch of an incendiary. Let there be no let up in this matter. If necessary there should be a called meeting of the Board of Aldermen, and a heavy reward offered. Such miscreants deserve the severest penalty of the law. There can be no palliation for such a crime. It ranks on our statute books with murder and should be so treated.

Not satisfied with the second attempt although successful it appears that the house was again fired during the latter portion of the night as an alarm was sent out about 12 o'clock, and found to proceed from the same premises. When the firemen retired from the scene after the first alarm, all traces of the fire had been extinguished. We have reason to know that our police department will use every possible effort to ferret out the author or authors of the outrage. Let it be pushed to the uttermost.

We are informed by Mr Lancaster that he lost all he had in the house.

For several years a number of the ladies of this city, feeling the need of some industrial training for the children of the town, have conducted a Sewing School. This year, this work has been placed on a more satisfactory basis than ever before. Old plans of work have been extended and new features added. Under the superintendence of Miss Mary Marsh, who has made a most successful record as a teacher in the Marphy school, the sewing school will open in the Centennial graded school, June 21st, at 9 o'clock. The school will be held from 9 to 11 o'clock, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays during June, July and August. To cover cost of materials used, a charge of twenty cents a month in advance will be made for each pupil. Girls from seven to sixteen admitted.
