

The Remedy.

There is much talk about the frequent raids of thieves in the suburbs, and especially during the past few months, in what is known as the "West End." A night or so since, the premises of three or four families were invaded and sundry articles stolen. So far, it has been unable to ferret out the scoundrels, and the isolated condition of the suburb is such that it is hard to suggest a remedy. Some people have spoken of the inefficiency of the police in the matter without ever once recurring to the fact, that the police of Raleigh have no authority whatever in the premises. Of course all well informed persons should know this, and no doubt the offenders themselves are cognizant of the fact. There must be a remedy however, and it would appear that it should be lodged with the county authorities. The property of every citizen should be protected, this being the object for which governments are instituted. One thing is certain, and that is, the people of the section referred to are determined not to be trifled with much longer. If protection does not come from some legalized authority, the right of self preservation will have to be resorted to, even to the extent of bullets and shot.

In this connection we have heard it intimated that application would be made for incorporating the suburb under the name of "West Raleigh," with municipal powers. As there is very little probability of the extension of the corporate limits of Raleigh for some years to come, this plan may be necessary for the proper protection of the large and constantly increasing population of the suburb.

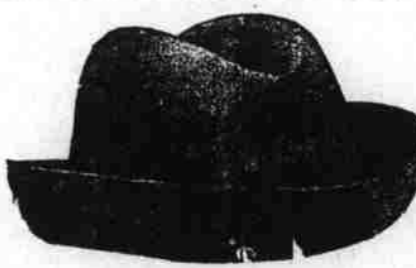

DOG TAX.

A tax upon every dog kept in the city limits is due and payable to the Chief of Police on the first day of July in each year. Every person owning a dog who shall fail to pay the tax during the month of July, or who shall keep upon their premises an unlicensed dog after the 1st day of August, shall be subject to a fine, and all persons who shall fail to give in their dogs shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and five dollars for each dog so omitted.
