The receipts of cotton in Raleigh for the week ending July 16, 1892, were 74 bales against 156 last year.

Gov. Holt and Dr. Hawkins have gone to Buffalo Springs to join their families.
The officials at the Capitol are now in the midst of the dull season. There is but little business doing in the departments.
Posters are out for the prohibition County Convention to be held in this city on Saturday July 30th, for the purpose of nominating a legislative ticket &c.
The local ministers conference will be the event of the present week. It will assemble with Central Methodist Church on Wednesday night at 8:15, o'clock.
