### THE ERIE CANAL.

New York, July 18.—A centennial anniversary occurs today which will pass practically unnoticed. In a few of the cities along the route of the Erie canal the one hundredth anniversary of the construction of canals in this country will be made the occasion of a banquet or ball by naval societies. The real reason for the failure to celebrate the event lay in the jealousy of the various cities along the route of the Erie canal aroused by the desperate efforts Buffalo made to secure the celebration. In this city an informal dinner will be given to friends of canal improvement by Orlando B. Potter and ex-Mayor Franklin Edson, both prominent members of the union for the improvement of canals. The discussion today may result in an effort to secure a deepening of the canal by two or three feet so as to increase its value as a waterway. Today it is a hundred years since the canal construction began in this state and in this country, and many important improvements have since been made on the system of canal construction throughout the United States, leaving the Erie canal a good deal of a relic in the way of artificial waterway.

DUBLIN, July 15.—Patrick McCormack was today fined a sovereign by a police magistrate here for damaging the grave of Charles Stewart Parnell, in Glasnevin Cemetery, and for destroying flowers that had been placed on the grave.

### THE VESUVIUS RUNS ASHORE.

NEW YORK, July 16.—The United States dynamite cruiser Vesuvius ran aground at Sunken Meadows in the East River early this morning, during a heavy fog. The tug E. S. Atwood was dispatched to the scene. The water almost floated the dynamite by noon, and when the Atwood began to pull on the cable she slid from her maddy bed and was soon in deep water.

The "promoter," who is said to have constituted the company and his friends sold out their stock as soon as the public had become interested in the enterprise, and now 15,000 stockholders are left to mourn the loss of their \$1,500,000.
